Fast-paced musical comedy a hit

If you missed the brief world premiere of Fingers & Toes last week at the Bluewater Summer Playhouse, you should try and catch it later this month as it tours the province.

More than a song-anddance show, it tells a wonderful story with some terrific one-liners.

The cleverly-crafted script, written by Logan Medland, takes you quickly from scene to scene, with the final act ending in a rapid-fire comedy routine that will leave you weak from laughter.

From his tap-dancing finesse to his incredible acting ability. Henne is dynamic in the character of Toes who tries to get his buddy, piano virtuoso Fingers, to snap out of the depression of losing his gal to another man.

Medland's concert pianist background is obvious in his powerful presence at the piano, as well as his marvellous ability to improvise.

ovise. Enter McGuigan with her powerful voice and tap-dancing talent equal to Henne and the pair stamp out some difficult and ingenious routines, beautifully choreographed by Randy Ganne.

The entire show, directed by Gyllian Raby, is tremendously entertaining from start to finish.

The role reversal of Fingers and Toes in the second act is as hilarious as it is poignant. The story races to the finish with such force that you can't believe you've been captivated throughout the 2 1/2-hour show.

If you enjoy music and dance, with a fast-paced comedic script, you'll love Fingers & Toes.

The show opens Aug. 14-30 at the Port Stanley Festival Theatre. From there it runs Oct. 7-12 at the Lighthouse Festival Theatre in Port Dover, and Oct. 15-19 at Theatre Orangeville.

It will be presented at the Centre in the Square, Kitchener, Feb. 17, 2004, followed by performances 18-21 at the Markham Theatre for the Performing Arts, Feb. 26 at the Heritage Theatre in Brampton, Feb. 28 to March 6 at Theatre Aquarius in Hamilton, March 10 at the Oakville Centre for the Performing Arts, March 11 at the Centre for the Arts at Brock University in St. Catharines, and March 13-14 at the Grand Theatre in Kingston.
